



Cover of The Month Round-The-World Flights of Amelia Earhart —Part II

Last month I began this series showing the only surviving cover of Amelia Earhart's Round-The-World flight attempts. This second installment high lights a "wannabe" round-the-world flight cover. It was sent under separate cover to Earhart with a typed cachet and request on the front "World Flight / March 1937 / Amelia Earhart & Capt. H. Manning". It was nicely franked with single copies of Scott #C20-22, the Transpacific Air Mail stamps issued for use on Pan American Airways

initial regular flights to connect the US with Asia.

The cover was a bit of a gamble, because Amelia had never carried collector submitted mail for her record setting flights. When she did carry covers, they were usually 50 to 75 in number, almost all hand signed. In the case of her round-the-world flight, the endeavor was so expensive that many sponsors were involved. One was Gimbel's Department Store which sold the only covers that were to be carried

on the flight. So this collector submitted cover was dutifully returned to Miss Florence Langtim of St. Louis Missouri with the notation "Could not take cover on flight". Though it is written in a very "close" hand, I suspect the notation is from Amelia's secretary rather than from her personally. It is postmarked March 11 1937 from Oakland California - just six days prior to the start of

Amelia's first flight attempt from Oakland.

For a couple of years prior to the flight, Amelia had been a member of the Purdue University Faculty. Purdue had its own airfield. This eventually led to the purchase of Amelia's Lockheed Electra model 10E by the Purdue Research Foundation and other contributors such as J. K. Lilly and Vincent Bendix. It was a "Flying Laboratory" with the latest in aeronautical equipment - Sperry Gyro-Pilot (early autopilot), Bendix direction radio finder and Western Electric communica-


tion equipment installed by Bell Laboratories. The plane was also fitted with additional fuel tanks extending the range of the ship to more than 4000 miles. When fully loaded it weighed 15000 lbs.

Preparations for the flight took many months and involved countless individuals, companies, organizations and governments. Since much of the flight would be over oceans, a navigator was essential. Harry Manning, former Captain of the United States Liner Roosevelt was selected for this role. By the time they took off they had added two more to the "crew". Fred Noonan an experienced aerial navigator, a veteran from many trips across the Pacific flying in the Pan Am Clipper Ships. And Paul Mantz an experienced pilot who could act as relief to Amelia. They took off from Oakland on March 17th and landed 15 hours 47 minutes later at Wheeler field in Hawaii on the 18th - (a new flight time record). Enroute they had passed one of Pan Ams clipper ships bound for Hawaii (piloted by Edwin Musick).

The cover illustrated at the bottom of page 11 was created by Richard Tokunaga (ANCS - American Naval Cancellation Society - #500, active in 1936-37). The printed cachet was his design and he

had it postmarked from the Light Cruiser USS Marblehead CL 12.

Originally the plan was to make a short stop in Hawaii before heading on to Howland Island. However, the latest weather report advised a short delay would be prudent. In the mean time, the engines were checked over and a new piece of navigational equipment was acquired. The plane was moved from Wheeler Field to the 3000 foot concrete runway at Luke Field. When they began take-off on the

morning of March 20th, the crew consisted of Amelia, Fred Noonan and Harry Manning. Noonan was scheduled to be dropped off at

Howland Island and Manning at Darwin Australia. The USS Quail was stationed midway on the route to Howland Island; the USCG Shoshone at Howland Island and the USS Ontario at the midway point between Howland and New Guinea. Unfortunately, these 'plane

guard' deployments were unnecessary. The plane ground looped and the right landing gear failed with subsequent damage to a wing. Some witnesses claimed a tire blew out. Others contended it was pilot error. An official report from a Naval investigation was very carefully worded with both views. The first R-T-W flight attempt by Amelia was over.

Earhart initialed asked that the disabled plane be shipped to San Francisco on an Army Transport ship. Her request was denied and the Electra was eventually shipped back to California on the Matson Liner S.S. Lurline. Over the next two months the engines were overhauled and the plane rebuilt at the Lockheed plant in Burbank. The direction of the next attempt also had to change because of weather patterns. Which also meant all new approvals had to be obtained, domestically and internationally. Part III of the story begins with the May 19th take-off on the 'shakedown' flight from Burbank to Miami.
